March 2024 Pulpit Post "The Light of the World"


"Jesus Christ, you are the light of the world. The light no darkness has overcome. Stay with us for it is evening and the day is almost over. Let your light scatter the darkness and shine within your people here." Holden Evening Prayer

Light and darkness. These are images and themes that are prevalent throughout the scriptures. The very beginning of the bible begins with God first creating light to break through the void and darkness that had only existed before God created all things. Darkness personifies evil and sin. John 8:12 records Jesus declaring, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but have the light of life." Jesus is goodness and forgiveness.

Throughout the month of March, we will begin each Midweek Lenten service proclaiming this truth by singing the introduction to the Holden Evening Prayer. Before we begin each service, we make clear who is the light of the world. The light IS Jesus Christ. These Lenten services are the very few times during the year when we gather to worship when it is dark outside. It is good for all of us to be reminded during these 40 days of Lent that we live in darkness and darkness can live in us. We are sinful. Jesus Christ endured the darkness of suffering and death on the cross for all of us. At the end of his suffering and death, on Easter morning three women came to the tomb when the sun had risen only to find that the Son of God had risen.

Every fall when the local football season begins, I comment on how we often get to **one** game where we can sit through the entire evening without coats and there is still some light when the game is over. That quickly changes as the season moves ahead. Soon the cold and darkness of fall and winter will be evident. The opposite takes place in the season of Lent. This year, the month of March begins in the season of Lent with darkness and the need for protection from the cold. But the last day of March this year is Easter Sunday. As we look forward to that day, we know that new life will be emerging from the ground reminding us of that Jesus Christ who is the light of the world has also risen from his tomb.

I encourage you to journey with us through the season of Lent as we experience the dark and cold of winter knowing that Jesus Christ who is the light of the world, is the light who shines in you. Hear this good news boldly proclaimed again on Easter morning!

BALTIC COUNCIL MEETING

January 9, 2024

This monthly meeting of the Baltic Lutheran Church Council was held at Baltic Lutheran Church on January 9, 2024. Council

members present were: Al Van Eck, Kelly LaValliere, Rick Fiala, Brett Teveldal, Dick Berg, Terry Snow, Jeff Boldt, Wayne Gunderson and Pastor Randall Questad. Also present was Lisa Skelly. Not present was Bryce Witzel.

Rick Fiala called the meeting to order, and Pastor Randall opened the meeting in prayer.

Meeting minutes from December did have an error in location of meeting. Corrected from "East Nidaros" to "Baltic" Lutheran Church. Motion to approve meeting minutes as amended by Al VanEck. Second by Dick Berg. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report

Lisa Skelly reviewed December financial report.

Lisa requested council discussion for mailing out annual report. Council discussed if the church would mail out the full annual report with the amended constitution this year or only the post card with information for the annual meeting. Brett Teveldal moved that the church would mail out the full annual report with the amended constitution this year. Second by Jeff Boldt. Motion carried.

Motion to approve December financial report by Jeff Boldt. Second by Kelly LaValliere. Motion carried.

Trustees' Report

Jeff Boldt discussed continued effort to eliminate wasps in the church. Shelving was finished in the closet by Terry Snow and Dick Berg. Tony Lee is still planning to complete snow removal this season.

Deacons' Report

Council discussed further defining the deacon's role, including assisting pastor with communion and ushering when role is not otherwise filled by an interested person.

Dick Berg recommended that the council reach out to individual families/kids to assist with greeting.

Old Business

Council had further discussion on insurance coverage for Baltic Lutheran Church. Council will continue to review options.

Baltic January Council Minutes (continued)

Brett Teveldal provided update on the Alliance Communications grant. Council discussed option of adding security cameras to the request. Once itemized lists are compiled, grant will be submitted.

New Business

Dick Berg recommended that the church pare down the number of folding chairs and tables and check with the congregation and community for interest in buying these items. Council will discuss with WELCA to determine next steps going forward.

Pastor Questad brought to council that after discussion with two recent organists during Baltic Lutheran services, the organ is not working correction and will need repairs. Pastor will call the company. Dick Berg recommended that the Offering Breakdown for 2023 be included in the mailing prior to Annual Meeting.

Pastor's Report

Pastor Questad was not able to meet with other area pastors regarding Lenten services due to weather. It does sound like previous years went well and will discuss doing a similar type of rotation this year.

Confirmation kids have expressed interest in doing a full week of confirmation camp this summer in Okoboji. Will look into having these kids do meals during Lent for fundraising.

Northern Rim Youth have not decided if they will or will not go to the National Youth Gathering.

First Communion will likely be during Palm Sunday again this year. Council retreat will be January 28, 2024, at 4 pm at Pastor Questad's residence.


Pastor Questad will be attending his nephew's wedding and will be gone June 2, 2024.


